articles in the North American Review(for July, 1892), in which you refer to Dr. Horatio Hale's paper in the Transactions of the Royal Society of Canada, Vol.IX, Section II, 1891, in which he "uses his wide knowledge of the languages of American aborigines, and other rude races, to show that grammatical complexity and logical perfection of these languages implies a high intellectual capacity in their original framers."

It may interest you in this connection to note that the Indian languages which I have been studying since 1871(as an original investigator) are highly complex, and not so simple as Dr.D.G.Brinton would have us believe(See his paper on Polysynthesis and Incorporation). I am compelled to disagree with Dr.Brinton on several points, as will appear from my remarks(in the next number of the American Anthropologist) on Mr.J.N.B.Hewitt's paper, "Is the polysynthesis of Duponceau applicable to American Indian Languages?" My address before Section H at the Madison meeting of the A.A.A.S. this year was directed in part against the application of the principles enunciated by Duponceau and Brinton to those Indian languages which I have been recording. I have taken the liberty of sending you a copy of this address(on "The Biloxi Indians of Louisiana", who have a complex language), with several other separates.
