INFRINGEMENT OF THE GUN-BARRELS PROOF ACT.

At the Birmingham Police Court yesterday—before Messrs. Hill and Cartland—Harry Green, gun-action maker, Clifton Koad, Aston, and Daniel Leonard, gminisher, Steelhouse Lane, were summoned for attempting to pledge a gunbarrel which was not properly proved.—Mr. Joseph Kowlands (law-clerk to the Birmingham Proof House) appeared to prosecute on behalf of the Guardians of the Birmingham Proof House, and stated that the sharee was laid under the 122nd section of the Cumbarrels Proof Act, 1866, which were not proved, and duly marked as proved, should be liable to forfeit £50. for every such offence; and section 109 stated that small arms should not be pledged before the barrels thereof had been proved at the Proof House. On the 6th of August the defendant Green went to the pledge shop of Mr. Aaron's assistant examined the gun, and found that the proper proof marks were not upon it.
