Dear Dr. Panson

When visiting at the
General Hospital I have been brought
in contact with a remarkably in-
tellectual & true English woman who
I think must have seen better days,
at least I found incidentally, that a
Clergyman I knew in Demerara of
the same name has her neck-
tie. Miss Matcham tells me her complaint
is such as to make it unlikely she
will ever leave the Hospital, tho'
she may linger for a long time -
What makes me name her case
to you is that she has in the
habit of attending the Bible Class
at St. Paul's Ch. That immediately
in front of you - with elderly, with

flat feet, Curb. She has a
very high esteem for you as a
x'tian, & it occurred to me long
ago, a visit to her bedside by
you would be appreciated & valued.
Of course I did not hint to her
I should acquaint you with her
Case, but of your many duties &
engagement admitted, I think you
would be pleased to visit her, as
she certainly would ^{be} & be greatly gratified
by it. I have got such a number
but blessing my self - as well as
enlargement of heart - both towards
God & man, from visiting the Hospital
that I have less scruple of making
the above suggestion, that you may
be partaker of the joy -

Mr. Dickson the Chaplain has a
short service every Sabbath after
noon for the Convalescent patients
(Some 15 or 20) at 3.30. - He is
away for three weeks, & I conduct

it for him - but if you were not,
otherwise occupied at that hour,
I would assist me with a short
Gospel address of 15 or 20 minutes
He would be greatly pleased -

engagement prevent it &
