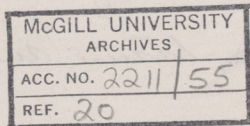


to this suggestion I will

My dear Sir,

Your favor of 4<sup>th</sup> is duly  
received accordingly we  
await your proposed arrival  
at Massena Station on Wed.  
18<sup>th</sup> inst.

I have taken out four  
large slabs on the roof  
and several others on ex-  
posed but up to the present  
have found no animal re-  
mains. The casts have been  
scattered about and fire

May a bore striking on the  
coal. Some of them have turned  
out to be black and carbon-  
aceous, and appear to contain  
nothing of value. The large  
stamp at high water proved  
to be so far from the outcrop  
of the coal as to make it  
a hopeless task to get it  
out. We blew out two or three  
feet of it and as it con-
