at its present price, and certain
to be profitable if judiciously worked
even with the present imperfect
apparances.

If placed on a new basis
its success will of course be affected by
the amount of Capital sunk in the
purchase of the property, and in

Methods employed in increasing the output. On these subjects I would remark:—

(1) As much of the Capital as possible should be left free for working purposes.

(2) The present proprietors especially Mr Miller, should have such interest as to ensure their aid and Coöperation.

(3) It would be well to begin regular underground mining at some one of the more important points — say the Fidelity Mine; but the present system of surface extraction must be continued and extended, as it will afford much phosphate and will open up the deposits.

(4) Accurate plans should be made of the openings on any portion of the property where more extended operations are contemplated.

(5) As it is not yet certain on which part of the property the greatest deposits will occur, and for a time

at least work must be done on
several of them, it would be
imprudent to erect ~~any~~ expensive
buildings at one place in the
mean time.

(6) There are neighboring phosphate
properties of this area with which
arrangements might be effected as
to roads or as what if a
strong company were formed might
become tributary to it or might
be amalgamated with it.

(7) It is probable that a
many of the outlying lots the mineral
might be extracted on contract or
tribute more profitably than by paid
labour.

These suggestions are of course
to be taken as my individual opinion
apart from the actual facts as to
the nature of the deposits contained
in my report.
