Through the columns of our local paper, Mr. Embrow, School Inspector, informs us of his resignation.

I intend to apply for the vacancy, and respectfully ask you, to use your influence on my behalf, as you offered to do, four years ago, when the previous inspector retired.

I think that I am entitled to a hearing from the Board of Public Instruction for the following reasons:

That I am a graduate of a Canadian University, holding the Academy Diploma of this Province, and the Head Master's Certificate for High Schools of Province of Ontario.

That I have been teaching few years in all.

That for nearly eight years, I have had charge of Lacoste College, one of the largest Protestant schools of this Province (outside of cities).

That the vacancy occurs in the District (Inspector's) in which I have worked for eight years.

I do not ask for Mr Eubanson's appointment as Inspector of Academies, but simply for his office as Inspector of Common Schools of the Counties of Argenteuil etc.

What you think that the principle of promotion should hold good amongst teachers as well as among the police of Montreal?

In your reply will you kindly advise me as to my best mode of proceeding in order to obtain

appointments, and as whether there is
any examination to be undergone
or not.

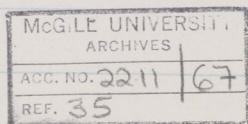
