I RECEIVED YOUR LETTER, WHICH WAS FORWARDED


TO E FROM NEW YORK.

BUT KNOWING NOTHING ABOUT FOSSIL BOTANY I DID NOTHING. FONTAINE SUCCEEDED
ME AND COLLECTED LARGELY. HE AND WHITE HAVE PREPARED A WORK WITH 25 4TO.
PLATES WHICH WILL BE PUBLISHED SOMEDAY BY THE PENN.GEOL.SURVEY.

I WISH THAT THE PALAEO-BOTANISTS COULD FIND SOME WAY TO STOP
THE DISCUSSION RESPECTING THE AGE OF THE LARAMIE COAL-BEDS. MY WORK
DURING THE PAST TWO SEASONS LEAVES NO CHANCE FOR E TO DO OTHER THAN TO
REGARD THEM AS FOX HILLS THROUGHOUT, IN SO FAR AS SOUTHERN COLORADO AND
NORTHERN NEW EXICO ARE CONCERNED. CRETACEOUS FOSSILS GO RIGHT UP, AND
AT ONE LOCALITY I WAS MEASURING FORT PIERRE IN MY SECTION WHEN TO MY
ASTONISHMENT I FOUND THAT I HAD INCLUDED NEARLY 200 FEET OF LARAMIE. IF
THE COAL BED WERE ABSENT FROM THE GA ISTEO REGION, NO BODY WOULD DOUBT
FOR A MOMENT THAT THE WH LE SERIES IS MIDDLE CRETACEOUS, UNLESS INDEED
HE SHOULD STUMBLE ON SOME OF THE PLANT IMPRESSIONS.
