The fossils, as far as
they go, indicate a
Lower Carboniferous age.
The most characteristic is
a small specimen of
Bohemella antiqua, of
which I send a better
specimen from my col-
lection for comparison.

There is also a
Modiola or Cypocardia



which may be the shell
I have called Modiola
chromia from Wundrow, N.S.
and a little Cardinia
like C. nova but not
determinable.

The most abundant
species is a Serpulites
which is very near
to my S. annulatus
from Nova Scotia but
the state of preservation

is so different that I
cannot be sure of
it.

The rock altogether
resembles one of those
black eroded lime-
stones which we find
in Nova Scotia in close
proximity to the beds
of Gypsum and which
are usually very poor
in fossils.
