Dear Sir.

Please to accept my best thanks for the communication of a copy of your very interesting and valuable memoir: On the Cretaceous and Tertiary Floras of British Columbia. As I have received it a few days ago but until to day, I had no time to read it through. Of course, I do not admit all your conclusions. But I do not wish to enter now into any discussion. The 8<sup>th</sup> vol. of Hazen's Geol. Reports which is a continuation of vol. 7<sup>th</sup> flora of the Cretaceous and Tertiary of the Territories is now ready and will be distributed in a few weeks. You will find there rectification of some former statements of mine made from too scanty materials. Thus for example a whole flora of the Green River or White river group which is at character is Oligocene but not Miocene as indicate in vol. 7. Also new types, beautfull ones for the Cretaceous Dakotas group. One, *Aspidiothylites* represented by a number of fully preserved leaves

of which I think your *Gyrostiphyllum boreale*  
Pl IV f 13 represents the base. When you have this  
work and also vol VII of the *Acta Phloae* of Heer  
which you do not appear to have seen yet, it  
will be possible to discuss with, or at more satis-  
factory numerous additional questions concerning  
the 10 very rich fossil floras of the N. A. cretaceous  
and Tertiary. I will take care that the 8<sup>th</sup> vol.  
be sent to you very soon. — Have you the Quet-  
zalcoatlus flora of Heer. Your *Magnolia magnifica* is  
so much like *M. Speciosa* of that flora, that  
it is scarcely possible to doubt identity.

I have to thank you still for the great  
pleasure, delight indeed, that has procured me  
the lecture of your address to the American  
Association at Minneapolis. It is by far the best  
not only of those which have been delivered to  
the meeting, but of all those of that kind I  
have read for a long time. I found it in scene.
