Dear Sir,

To-day I expressed to you a small box of specimens chiefly from Stony Mountain. Those sent before being principally from Selkirk quarries

I also send portions of the Carapace of land turtles found by me in the Ross Coulee this summer and a piece of iron stone from Medicine Hat, taken from a band a few feet above the river level and considerably below the coal

On close inspection you will perceive a feathery-like plant

Associated with this is a plant with circular leaves. I think a

a friend of mine (Mr Byrom) called
your attention to it and gave you a specimen

I have only one leaf. The collections
from Stony Mountain will give you
a good idea of the deposits. Any
light coloured (whitish) are from Selkirk
The Maclurea is from Black
Bear Island Lake Winnipeg and
the small weathered piece of Chain
coral from Swampy (Bereus on map)
Island of same — To-day I send
you a paper containing one of a
series of my letters upon our
trip "In the mountains". It gives
the description of our climb to the
summit of one which we took the
liberty to call after yourself and
which I hope will continue to bear the
name — Near the summit we found
among the shaly rock what appeared
to be fossiliferous remains and a
fragment of rock exceedingly like

Eozoon - My collection of fossils
is now in the Manitoba Provincial
Museum established this summer.

Regarding the fossils sent you
lately you are at liberty to keep them and I
shall be glad to receive any information
concerning them - I would consider
it a great favor if you could give me
a copy of your paper read in England
on a section from Winnipeg to the Mountains

Desiring to congratulate you
upon the honor lately conferred and
of which you were so eminently
deserving, also hoping you may
be ^{long} permitted to assist in harmonizing
Science and religion
