I have looked
at the fossils you were
so kind as to send.
The prevailing plant is
~~Crinoids~~ Crinoids Coriophora
represented by leaves and
fragments of stems. There
is also a Cardiocarpum
C. acutum Brongt or like it,
and pinnules of a
Neuropteris not certainly
determinable; but may

he N. Loshii Mapt. The material is not very ample; but so far as it goes, it belongs to the coal measures.

Beds like these, similarly filled with leaves of Conductites, occur at several places south of the Coburgs, as far down as the Fine Islands; beyond which few more beds with a

Millstone grit flora. I
have referred these
condrites beds to
the lower part of
the coal measures
near the top of
the Millstone Grit,
or perhaps within the
limit of the Millstone
Grit itself.
