The original small edition of the above described work, which was re-printed, from the same type, as Chapter VI., of SCHARF'S *History of Westchester-county, New York*, is now offered for sale.

It is illustrated with a fine steel-plate Portrait, by Alfred B. Hall; exact copies of the two Military Maps, illustrative of the military operations within the County, which were drawn by the Engineers of the Royal and the American Armies, for their respective Commanders-in-chief; and two fine wood-cuts, *fac-similes*, copied from contemporaneous drawings, now in the British Museum.

Although its Author was prevented by circumstances which he could not control, from completing the work which he originally proposed to do, and notwithstanding portions of what he had written, (in some instances, what had cost him more of research and study than what was retained,) were omitted, with his approval, in order that the article, when re-printed, might be compressed within a limited number of pages of the proposed *History*, it is believed that in no other work have the origin and progress of the Revolution, in the Colony of New York, been so fully and so faithfully presented; and it is known that the process of revolutionizing the old and conservative agricultural County of Westchester, with all the revolting barbarism of that lawless process, has not been as fully and faithfully recorded, in any other publication, whether general or local, contemporary or recent. In every instance, as far as he has been able to acquire information, the Author has presented the acts of individual leaders of the great Rebellion of 1774-1783, as well as those of the conservatives of that period, as far as the latter are known to have had any leaders, and as far as any of those acts, of either party, are known to have affected the

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farmers and other inhabitants of Westchester-County, during that period, with entire impartiality, with rigid fidelity, and with unflinching fearlessness; and the military operations of the two Armies, in the Campaign of 1776, as far as that Campaign extended to Westchester-county, have been presented with more than usual particularity. *The actions at Pelham and on Chatterton's-hill, it is believed, have been more completely described, in this, than in any other publication, contemporary or modern.*

Of this handsome volume only two hundred and fifty copies have been or will be printed, and of these, only two hundred are or will be offered for sale; and, because a considerable portion of the Author's compensation, for more than two years of constant and arduous labor, in the preparation of this work, is wholly dependent on his sales of those copies which are now offered, he respectfully hopes that those who are interested in the history of Westchester-county, or in the political history of the Revolution, in New York, or in the military history of the country, will favor him with their orders.

The work will be issued, as such privately-printed and privately-circulated works are generally issued, stitched, entirely uncut, and in paper covers, affording an admirable opportunity for the insertion of other illustrations, by those who shall incline to do so. A very few copies, in sheets, folded and unstitched and entirely uncut, have been reserved for such gentlemen as shall prefer them in that condition.

Every copy of the work will be numbered, signed, and registered by the Author.

Notwithstanding the small number of copies of this volume which have been or will be printed, and notwithstanding the great amount of reading matter which it contains—three of Mr. Bancroft's large octavo volumes of his *History of the United States* do not contain more of letter-press than it contains, and are sold for seven dollars and a half—the price will not be as great, in proportion to the relative number of pages, as that which was designated by the Publishers of the recently published *History of Westchester-county*, in their original Prospectus, for the entire volume of that, then, proposed *History*.
