

## The Book "GOSHEN."

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THE last Memoir of the EGYPT EXPLORATION FUND, entitled **Goshen**, etc., is much smaller than our preceding Memoirs, and, in a popular sense, less interesting as the eleven plates, however beautifully executed, are mainly scholastic and illustrate the Egyptian texts. The discovery of the site, as narrated in this Memoir, is nevertheless of the greatest importance, not only to the Fund's special line of explorations,\* but to the world-wide desire to have the locale of "the Land of Goshen" determined, and the monumental religious belief of its Egyptian inhabitants, particularly during the Hebrew sojourn, ascertained.

But our next Memoir, entitled, **Tanis, Part II.**, will include Nebesheh, Tahpanhes, and other sites. Illustrated by some fifty plates, it will be far more popularly interesting than GOSHEN, and be a noble supplement to TANIS, PART I., and NAUKRATIS, PART I.

And yet most of our readers need not be reminded that our primary object is not to produce elegant books — to entertain and to "sell" — and that it is to devote the bulk of the limited means at our disposal to the direct work of exploration and research. This is our paramount duty. Your duty, and of many others, is to see that our work of exploration, on behalf of education and the progress of knowledge, be supported and continued.
