My dear Sir -

I am very grateful
to you for your kind reply to my request.
I need hardly assure you that your opinion
is not for publication or any improper use.
Editors regard their periodicals as a trust - and
when I appear with such papers they want -
assurance that my science is sound, not
pseudo-science or likely to cause criticism
and antagonism from those whom I prefer to
represent. For this purpose only I want an
opinion as to method and argument - and
fact from scientific standpoint. My opinion
of course does not count. Yours will.

I consider sound analogy and verifiable
hypotheses as legitimate scientific
instruments as history of all great
scientific generalizations proves. I have not

your outside of accepted scientific facts
& theories and therefore think I am
scientific. I do not ask agreement or
criticism, or commendation, though from you
all would be welcome and valuable.

But as a student may make errors in the
laboratory and his work be invalidated
still conviction of that would not involve
denial of his principles or methods as
scientific, so I ask the same judgement—
not as to all my conclusions but as to
method. With this if favorable I can
probably secure a hearing. I send Nos. 1 2
& 3. No 3 I should be glad to have you
keep if you can to. The others I must
beg to have returned as my stock is
very limited. No 4, Science & Miracle
is the one I specially wish to get before
the public. It is the only view I know of
which science can admit and theology
accept. But it is in vns. I hope to have
a type written copy soon, but shall not

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send it where you care to ask for it,
as I have already taxed your time
and kindness more than I have any
right to. A statement that my
work would not be repudiated in your
opinion by scientific men as unusual
science, even though they differed in
views, is what the editor would want.

Anything you choose to add beyond that
I should value highly for myself and
all I should consider as strictly
private.
