My Dear Sir William:-

I returned from Quebec this morning and have just before me a letter from Dr. Heneker, enquiring what I propose to do with my several Bills of last Session. I shall write you pretty much in the sense that I have answered him.

I have abandoned my original Bill respecting the Provincial Board of examiners for admission to the study of the professions; but I have given notice of the introduction of a Bill to exempt from such examination the holder of the University Degree of B.A.. This, I shall press.

As to the Bar Bill, I wish you would confer with Mr. Trenholme and let me know as soon as possible what you think of it.

I am half disposed to introduce a Bill to strike out from the Jesuit's Act of last Session the provision giving to the Protestants sixty thousand dollars. Our people do not seem to be happy over it and Mr. Mercier and his friends are constantly reminding us of their generosity in this respect. It would,
