Before the war there was a geological survery which was a failure. Between 1874 and '79 there was a survey under one Little, but owing to the use of whiskey there wasenever any results , and the State got nothing for the \$ 50,000 spent This made a new survey difficult to organize. At last, I have been working, and lobbying, and we have gotten a bill for \$ 8,000 a year through the Legislature. As long as it is my fortune to stay in Georgia I want to get-b hold the position of State GeoTagistis pracitally no knowledge of the Geology of the State, except general N, and there are no geologists in Georgia Although I have not been in Georgia long enough to be above outside support, yet I have reasons to believe

the Gov. - J.B. Gordon will appoint me, I write this to ask you (a dreatetter)
to write to Gen. Gordon suggesting my appointment, as you have heard
that the Survey is to be established. It is a private letter that
I wish you to send to him direct, if you feel that you can. This
has been my first attempt at lobbying a Legislature, and I hate
politics. In Missouri, my good friend Pres. Laws did that, and through
him I got the money for the museum. The gaientific support of the
University I count most on, but after all they are not Geologists.
I send you s copy of a letter from my good friend of the Alabama

I never liked Missouri, but I do like Georgia. The heat is not as great as I feared, which fear kept me from coming here three years before. Of course, I would rather be where I could continue my lake work, as in Toronto. But if I cannot, then I prefer Georgia.

I am sorry to trouble you, but a private expression of your opinion will the free perfectly confident of my position here as a Geologist, but as with almost all things in the South, a half qualified man whose relations were of political influence, would probably triumph. Here people are cousined even to the fifth degree. It is family comnection rather than social position.
