Sir:

I am sending herewith galley proofs and manuscript of the article by yourself and Professor Penhallow, accepted sometime since for publication by the Geological Society of America. You will greatly oblige by revising the proofs and returning as promptly as may be. I beg to direct particular attention (1) to the arrangements of authors names with respect to titles of the two parts of the paper; (2) to the use of titles in connection with authors names; (3) to the list of contents, not submitted with the manuscript but prepared here; and (4) to some alterations in the supplementary manuscript submitted by Professor Penhallow after the completion of the original paper - which alterations were made to secure uniformity.

With return of proofs it would be well to indicate whether you desire separate copies (at cost of paper and press work) in addition to the thirty copies supplied gratuitously by the Society. It would be well to indicate also whether these separates are to be forwarded to you, to Professor Penhallow, or part to each.

By reason of the unexpected pressure at New York and the consequent failure of the Council to hold a final meeting it has become necessary to submit a question concerning publication to the authors of the New York papers: The Plan of puplication devised by an Advisory Committee submitted at Toronto (a copy of which I think I had the pleasure of handing you in person) was adopted in general terms by the Council; but action was not taken concerning certain of its features. This plan provides for prompt publication in separate brochures rather than the slower form of publication in bulk. This involves slight extra cost, principally that of covers for the separate brochures. Now in the absence of definite authority from the Council the secretary and the editor ad-interim have hesitated to impose the additional financial burden involved in the prompt publication upon the Society, and have decided to give individual authors the option of prompt publication at some additional cost to themselves or the more dilatory publication wholly at the cost of the Society. The additional cost of prompt publication has been made that of covers, or four dollars; the difference in time of publication ranging from two to four months (it would have been five or six months had not a considerable part of the authors assumed the cost of their covers, thereby facilitating publication of the entire series). We have been induced to adopt this course chiefly by the consideration that no burden will be imposed upon those authors who desire to obtain more than the usual thirty separate copies and to have the papers covered; for we have arranged that the cost of covers for the entire edition used by the Society as well as that going to the author shall be the same as the usual price for covers of a special author's edition. Papers by authors who are ready to bear the cost of covers will be worked off in separate form as rapidly as possible, and distributed by the Society, as in the case of the Orton paper which you have already received. Other papers will be held in the printing office for issue in bulk with the Proceedings, after the usual manner of publication of entire volumes.

Now will you further oblige by advising with return proofs whether you prefer the prompt publication which involves the cost of covers, or whether it would serve you equally to have the memoir issued in bulk with the Proceedings?
