made comparisons, I will
return the tooth. The
putte perhaps impression of the
Acrolepis is very good.

With regard to the Amphibian
in which you kindly promised
to help us, a complete printed
Catalogue will be issued in a
few days or weeks, and from
that you will be able to judge
of the collection.

I spent one day in
Quebec after leaving Montreal,
and then proceeded South to
Cambridge, where I saw a

great deal of interest among
Palaeozoic Fishes.

Prof. Agassiz
has bought a great deal
more than I imagined, both
from Europe and America.

Just before sailing, I paid
another brief visit to Prof.
Marsh, and concluded by
going to see some excavations
in an Algonquin mound near
New York.
