of a testimonial letter.

Having taught for eight
years in Montreal, my
sister Catherine and I
are desirous of obtaining
positions in one of the
American schools. In
making applications

for positions here, we have
been requested to present
letters from those who are
acquainted with our edu-
cational work and train-
ing. Occupying as you
do the highest position as
an educationist, and being
intimately associated with
the Normal School and
having a thorough know-
ledge of the work in the
public schools, in which
we taught, a letter from

you will prove invaluable
to us. We were trained
in McGill Normal School
where I secured the Wilson
prize and Prince of Wales
medal. my sister taking
second position. At the
opening of Sherbrooke St
School we were appointed
to its teaching staff, and at
the inauguration of the High
School for Girls the following
year I was one of four select
ed from among the teachers

in the employ of the Board
to fill a position in that
institution. After teaching
six years, we resigned to pur-
sue the study of modern lan-
guages in Europe, spending
one year in Paris and two
in Stuttgart, Germany. On my
return I undertook the training
of Janie & Inez Botterell for the ti-
tle of A. A. and matriculation
in McGill, in which they took high
rank, and their creditable stand-
ing throughout their course has
been very gratifying to me.
Trusting that I am not trespass-
ing on your kindness.
