letter came I went into the City again
& found that the sheet was "taken up"
to be finished off, as I had told them

when I saw them last; - ^{I found that} there
would be a great difficulty & expense
in making your proposed alteration
of the "modified" passage, owing to its
being between two of the large figures,
& longer than the paragraph proposed
to be altered! So I have had to leave
it alone. The extra note is much
