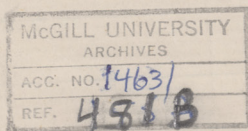

Caused by Stupidity of Caucus Officers.

No Democratic Candidates for the House in Wd. 11.

It will grieve the hearts of the democratic candidates for the legislature in wards 9, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23 and 25 to learn that their names will not appear on the ballot on election as regular nominees of the party, but that they will have to be designated "dem. cit. nom.," that is "democratic citizens" running on nomination papers. The good people of ward 11 will also be interested to know they are not to be given the privilege of voting for anybody for the legislature but republicans, so that Messrs. Lowell and Holden will enjoy the unique distinction of having a unanimous election.

N. J. Grace, one of the democratic candidates in wd. 23, may also be surprised to read this morning that after all his hustling yesterday to secure the requisite number of names to his nomination paper, his name cannot be placed on the ballot, even as an independent, because his paper is clearly illegal.

The law requires that one of the signers of a nomination paper must take oath before a justice of the peace that he believes the signatures on that particular paper are bona fide. At the bottom of Grace's paper appears the signature of P. M. Keating, a justice of the peace, who certifies that G. H. Johnson, whom he says he believes to be one of the signers, has appeared before him and taken the oath required. There is no G. H. Johnson among the signers of the paper, however, which indicates the amount of care which this justice exercised in scrutinizing the names.

All of this was due to the stupidity of the caucus officers at the recent democratic representative caucuses, who, in wards 9, 11, 18, 21, 22, 23, and 25, failed to file with the secretary of state within the proper time the certificates of nomination. Fourteen candidates were affected, and yesterday woke up to read with surprise in the newspapers that the certificates of their nomination at the recent caucuses had not been filed with the secretary of state by 5 p. m. Thursday, according to law, consequently their names cannot go on the official ballot as regular democrat nominees, and the only way that they can get before the people on election day is for them to run on nomination papers.

LOWELL INSTITUTE.

The Lowell Institute Lectures, founded by Mr. John Lowell, jun., and established 1839-40, are now given in Huntington Hall, Rogers Building, 491 Boylston street, Boston, Massachusetts.

These lectures are FREE. Holders of tickets must show them at the hall door, as no one will be admitted without a ticket.

Numbered tickets are issued for each course, and seats having corresponding numbers are reserved for the holders of these tickets during the course; also for each course a limited number of ADMISSION tickets without reserved seats; and usually, for a single lecture, SLIPS, to be taken up at the hall door, may be obtained in the ante-rooms at Rogers Building a few moments before the beginning of the lecture.

The several courses, with time, place and conditions for obtaining tickets, and other particulars, are advertised in the Boston Daily Advertiser and the Boston Evening Transcript, usually a week at least before the beginning of each course.

If, after a public distribution, tickets remain for any course they may be obtained of the janitor in Huntington Hall, between 10 and 12 A. M., or between 2 and 4 P. M., any week day, but NOT ON THE EVENINGS of the lectures. An application for such a ticket, if by mail, must be addressed to the CURATOR OF THE LOWELL INSTITUTE, 491 BOYLSTON ST., BOSTON, and have with it a properly addressed stamped envelope, to secure a reply.

Numbered tickets cannot be duplicated, therefore persons obtaining tickets which they afterwards find they cannot use are requested to return the same to the janitor or doorkeeper, for other applicants.

Tickets for the several courses will be given out as heretofore in the Cadet's Armory, 130 Columbus ave. Minors are not allowed to take places in the line of applicants.
