return much benefited in health.
The Elections will be over before
you get back and the result
will I hope be in favor of
the Gov. I do not think the
school question will have a
bad effect. my opinion is that
the common sense of the people
will triumph. In our section
the troubles of last winter is
going to be our Bili. Noir but
we hope it will only be in
fact - and not in reality.

My family have left here
for good having gone to
St. John to reside.
