chancellor one who has outlived

Dear Sir,

I beg to submit to your criticism and emendation a draft of a petition for presentation to the City Council.

In Rev^d D. Danson has read it, and I am charged to represent his views in regard to it. He thinks, very wisely from a certain point of view, that it would be better to omit from paragraph 10 the sentence surrounded by a blue line, and to make the first and last sentences of that paragraph read consecutively. He questions the propriety of enumerating with our

wants a school for vagrant children, as this though a real necessity may be regarded by some as an educational luxury. I have ventured to say that so far as my judgment reaches it will be well to enumerate our wants as they appear to us, so that if an increase of taxation be required it may be possible to say we asked in view of certain needs, we were required, and the onus of supplying the want does not lie on us.

Dr Norman hesitates to ask for $\frac{3}{10}$ of one per cent. This is larger than $\frac{1}{4}$ of one per cent and less than $\frac{1}{3}$ of one per cent

One fourth of one per cent would give the Board \$16100 additional, $\frac{3}{10}$ of $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ would give an increase of \$32200 and $\frac{1}{3}$ of $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ would give an additional \$42900. The latter increase is not needed, the first is too little. Some of the City fathers at your interview with them said that $\frac{1}{4}$ of one per cent would give you \$20000 increase. There must be a very considerable increase in valuations before this can be this the case.

Finally, in view of these considerations, Dr. Doorman thinks,

especially as the resolution of
the Board passed last May
called for $\frac{1}{3}$ of one per cent,
that it will be well to say that
less than $\frac{3}{10}$ of 1% will not suf-
fice to carry on and improve the
work of the City Schools.

Miss Baillie wishes to
resign at Christmas in view of
her approaching marriage. Miss
Renderson would like to return
to the school and take the va-
cated place.

For the consideration of the
above matter, and of the petition
to the Council, the Chairman in-
structs me to call a meeting of
the Board for Thursday of this
week.



Hydrants placed outside of
the building would be for
more use in case of a fire
and we think that steps
should be taken of making
an application to the Fire
Committee on behalf of the
College, for two or more
hydrants on the grounds where
they could be used for fire
in any of the college buildings.

My dear Dr Dawson,

I receive very little information about the progress of the Museum except what I get from you. I have had however very recently from the architect's tracings of the plan of heating with an explanatory letter. I suggested that if possible there should be a hot air register in the Entrance Hall and that perhaps a more speedy ascent might be found for the hot water from the boilers to the coils above. This might be got by putting the
boilers

boilers in different places. My knowledge
of the subject is very rudimentary but
experience has taught me that tradesmen
often do very stupid things. Long
horizontal pipes will necessitate a great
deal of fuel and the result will never
be satisfactory - There may be more of
a rise in the basement than can be
indicated on a plan -

I hope soon to hear that the roof has
been completed without farther delay and
that the work is going on inside.

I am not at all surprised that the
new endowment subscription does not
make great progress - I did not antici-
pate much from it. The present gene-
ration of Merchants has not recovered
from the losses of the last seven years.
Improvement has commenced, but
they

They will not be in the position many of them
were in some years ago for a good while yet.
Those of them who can give have had
many opportunities hitherto of which
only a few have
~~they have not availed themselves~~ - and
there are some who would not give
a dollar even to save the ^{or any other literary institution} college from
extinction. It is not difficult to find
reasons for not giving. And there are
persons who really do not feel it a duty
to help any object. They have no more
notion of such a duty than a blind man
born blind has of colour. I have
met such people and I fear they are
not scarce. But I do not despair for
all that. You will leave the college in
a vastly better condition than that in
which you found it. It is not given
to

To every man to see the completion of the
work he commenced, I have little
doubt that if another ten years be granted
you you will by that time have realized
what you now aim at; but you will then
have farther aspirations and still
feel some disappointment that you
cannot realize them.

I am sure that you must be devoting
not only a great deal of time but a
great deal of money in collecting
specimens for the Museum - That
reminds me to say that I will not tax
the Museum fund for the expenses of the
Whale's head - let it be my contribution
to the collection.

We had a short visit from Rankine before
he went to Paris and a call after his return

Dear Sir,

I am very sorry that I did not see you on Monday. I am feeling much run down and so I took the same holidays as the schools.

The following resolution passed unanimously at the meeting of Friday last

Resolved - That the necessities of this Board absolutely demand an increased revenue, and that an increase of taxation to one third of one per cent on the valuation of real estate would amply suffice for present needs; also that the Secretary be instructed to communicate with the Hon. James Ferriero to this effect and request him to urge the matter on the Government in the event of any amendment to the Education Act's being sought.

Your note was submitted at the Board and your views were esteemed by all as having great weight. But it was also felt that to bring the matter under the cognizance of the City Council was to ensure defeat. Such is the position of the Board that there ought to be either an immediate large reduction of the expense of the Board or a proportionate increase of revenue. The morality of anticipating the revenue of future years by run-

going any further into debt is open to question.

On the stand which you shall take in this matter depends very much the success of the movement, for Hon. J. Ferris will be much influenced by what you may say. I understand that Mr Ferris feels himself somewhat slighted in that he was not consulted in the matter. You will I am sure be good enough, should you see him, to disabuse his mind in this regard. The Protestant Board of School Commissioners initiated no steps towards an increase of taxation, nor are they so deeply in debt as their Catholic brethren. But, when the matter was submitted to them last Friday, they were only too glad to support as best they could a measure which promises to maintain, if not to increase, the efficiency of their schools.

Had the initiative been with the P.S.C. Commiss^o it is probable that they would have asked for no more than $\frac{1}{4}$ of a cent in the dollar; but the Board feared the effect of asking for an amount differing from that asked by the Catholic Board. One fourth of one per cent would probably produce \$80,000 per annum, $\frac{1}{3}$ of one per cent \$107,300.
