Dear Papa

Below is the number & amount of deposits entered in my bank book since the account was opened. The first £60 was the bulk of the B of £100 which you gave me when I left home. I had besides some money in hand at the same time, & since (last winter) £10- were sent to me for a collection of shells I think which was not entered in the Bank.

anything with them; I am afraid I have  
little knowledge enough of the subject  
at any time at present.

The Entomostracans which Bredy  
has named are the recent ones. Those that  
I picked from the foramin material, & sent  
to him while you were here. I cannot  
find his letter, but if I remember  
rightly he said that he had got on  
some length with the fossil ones.  
Mr. Etheridge's son who was on the  
Australian survey, is at present out  
of employment & looking for something  
to do. Mr. E. was thinking of trying to get  
Hartley's post for him. Indeed I understood  
Belwin had offered it to him, but he thought  
the salary too small. If Broom is  
prevented from resuming his work,  
what would the salary of that post  
be?
