My dear Father

I called this morning

at D^r Anzoux' in answer to a note he sent me & find the matter has assumed a slightly new aspect but still it is rather a change for the better. He now has the things all ready and packed, but he says that he must be paid for them before he can send them, & pointed out to me a note on the first page of his catalogue where it is stated that orders must be accompanied with a remittance. The box was rather a thin one, so I told him to put them in a heavier one, & I am to see them tomorrow afternoon before he sends them.

I suppose it will amount to
the same thing if I pay him
now as indeed it may save
you some trouble. I am afraid
however that he will not give
any discount but I do not sup-
pose he would in any case. I
will be able to send you the re-
ceipt on Friday I hope. I will
go this morning to Gill and draw
the amount required and I think
I can get permission from the In-
spectors to be late, in case the
hour & a half is not sufficient
for that, & my breakfast. ~~The~~
Our afternoon lecture today is
at the end of the afternoon so
that it comes conveniently in that
respect. The things are to be in
their new box tomorrow afternoon,
and if he sends them at once after
that they ought to leave Liverpool
on Thursday of next week which
will be the 2nd December; they ought
therefore to arrive the week after this
letter. I am very glad indeed to
be able to be of any use to you

by being here, especially as you are so liberal to me & so thoughtful in fore seeing all my wants.

There is a young fellow of the name of Craig staying at Mr. Bradel's at present. He is from Port Hope in Ontario and came here with a letter of introduction to Dyke from Miss ~~McClosson~~ Macpherson. He has been studying for the Ministry & is intending to go out to India as a Missionary in connection with the Baptist mission there in the S.W. of the country. He has been travelling since spring having spent the summer in England & Scotland; & is that going to spend a month here & then return to London & spend the winter in Germany probably in Berlin. & in the spring see Switzerland & Italy before returning to Canada. His principal objects in travelling are to see all kinds of Mission & Christian work and also to learn French & German; although why he wants to know so many

languages I do not know. He is a graduate of Toronto University & took honours in Classics. I should have thought him about 18 or 19, but he is 23, rather good-looking, with curly hair. He is tremendously loquacious & communicative & I already know all his family history, & all about the young lady he is engaged to, &c. He forms a fourth at dinner, & I also hear the news from him, as he gets an English Paper.

But I must now close. I will have to admit my letter to be overweight & put £2. on it. I will get a two-frame stamp if I can for Mackine's benefit.
