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My dear Father,

I called upon Sir John

Rose in London to ask him about my reporting upon the engineering exhibits at the Paris exhibition. He referred me to the Secretary of the Commission, Mr<sup>n</sup> Unwin (I think) to whom he gave me a note. I learn from him that the British Commission do not contemplate having any report made, as they consider that no one reads such things. He also informed me that in case of any report being thought of, the Commission would employ a person who had already made a name for himself in the profession, as otherwise the report would not be thought anything of. He advised me somewhat strongly to see all I could of

the Exhibition, and said that I might perhaps get some position in connection with it, as assistant — (I forget what) which would enable me to pay my expenses while remaining to see it. He gave me his Paris address, and told me he would be glad to do anything he could, etc.

This opens up my way a little so far as Canada is concerned, & I suppose it is worth while applying although I am likely to receive a similar answer. I will write to Mr<sup>r</sup> Page & Mr<sup>r</sup> Fleming at the same time, to try to gain their support in the matter.

I received your letter in which you ask me to get a Catalogue for Dr. Johnson. I called at the place, but it seems that only one of the volumes can now be had, all the others being out of print. I got it & send it by this mail. The price is £10<sup>00</sup> with £1.75 postage. Making in all \$2.35. I did not think it worth sending to London as it was but one volume. Enclosed to with it is an advertisement of Mr. ~~not~~ Teordolical apparatus, on which there

ought to be a volume. The volume  
on Chemical apparatus will appear  
before spring, but unfortunately  
the vol: on Light & Electricity is  
not expected to be reprinted for a  
year or two.

I am now putting the notes  
I took when on the Canal de l'Est  
into a consecutive form. I found  
it rather difficult to get under  
way at first, as general questions  
such as the reason for the construc-  
tion of the Canal ever having been  
contemplated had to be met; and  
the general arrangement of the sub-  
ject had to be decided upon. My  
average for the first day or two  
was about two pages of foolscap;  
but since then I have been getting  
on a little faster. I find it very  
interesting, but unfortunately I  
have to leave out many interesting  
details which I might go into if  
I had two months of leisure in-  
stead of two weeks. I do not write  
in the evenings, as I do not care  
to tire myself. I got a Cooper  
Me. when I was in London, (a nice  
gilt-edged illustrated edition for 2/9)

and I have begun to read a little  
of it. Also Scott's poems, & some  
music for the flute; so that I am  
not at a loss when an odd half  
hour turns up.

I called at the School the  
other day for a book I wanted, but  
there are no notices up yet. The  
courses will commence on Saturday  
of next week, Nov. 8.

I will probably draw upon  
Gill before the session opens al-  
though I hardly need anything yet.  
I spent £6-9-10 in passing through  
England, and yet the two journeys only  
came to £2-5-0. I gave in addition  
23/- for a pair of boots, which left  
about £3 in hand on arriving here.  
I had £22 from last year, & also  
\$4.10 from what you gave me on leaving  
which I changed in London. Then there were  
£83 which ~~return~~ I pay now into  
account foot commissions &c de-  
ducted last winter. Altogether this  
gives me quite a little set ~~up~~ in  
commencing.
