Dear Father,

Since writing last, I have seen the Lt Governor who had told me more than once that he wished to talk over the matter of the survey I am now making; I found him in when I called me afternoon, and gave him the explanations he wished, and also took the opportunity to mention my desire of obtaining work from this new Railway Company. I tried to show the importance of my present work, and

its advantage to the Province; and
hoped that any change that I might
make would not interfere with its
continuance; and said also that the
new position at which I aimed wd
be of quite as much service to the
Province as my present one; in all
of which he agreed with me. The
Syndicate is the all-absorbing topic
at present. The Bill has passed ~~it~~
the Lower House, & was sent up
to the other House this afternoon.
It will there meet with considerable
opposition, as the "Grits" will endeavour
to treat it as a party question. The
Govt. appear confident of having
a small majority in its favour
however. There have been no material

changes made in it; and its fate
will probably be decided this week.
Mr. Blinckett, whom I saw yesterday,
tells me that he intends leaving for
Montreal as soon as the measure
passes, to arrange for the appoint-
ment of a Chief Engineer, for which
post he has already received some
forty applications. He will then
return here (probably with the Chief
Engineer) and will leave for Eng-
land on the 18th of March. He
advises me to hand him an ap-
plication for the position of "Division
Engineer" on which he will make
his own notes ^{and recommendations} and keep in ready
ness to lay before the Chief Engineer
as soon as he is appointed. This

seems to me my best plan, and I
intend to ~~do~~ act upon it. Mr Blanks-
ett's name is the only one signed to the
agreement accompanying the Act. The
other names have now been made
public & I enclose a list of them.
Fyler is President of the G.T.R.; Lord
Campbell a brother of the Marquis of
Borne; Lord Ashley is a son of the
Earl of Shaftesbury, I believe; Baker and
Lowell are Yarmouth men; and
Duffus a Halifax merchant. I will
see what answer I get from Major
Rogers; although I think I am likely to
get a better offer from this Company.
I would certainly prefer this Province
to the Rocky Mountains.
