Dear Father,

The omission you mention with respect to showing me your collections also occurred to me when I was about half-way here. On thinking over the matter it does not appear to me to be serious, as the most I shall do in the way of geology is to determine the limits of the granite areas. This I should like to do, as it will be of use to me in the field, as less detail will be required upon them than elsewhere, and they are likely to form lines of secondary watershed

which will be more inaccessible than
the other parts of the country, & would
occupy more time in surveying than the
other regions.

I have received your copies of the
reports you mention in your letter. They
were however offered to me by Mr
Breedman, so that I am sorry you
should have parted with yours; but
I can easily have other copies sent
you if you wish. I called at
Mr. Kimbly's for a copy of your Asi-
atic Geology for which I am much
obliged. I shall mark on my country
map which I take with me, the
limit of the "Silurian" area as a
guide to the extent of my work,
although in working up the river
valleys I shall have to include more

in some instances. I shall also endeavor
to determine the boundary of the "Silurian"
historically at any rate.

I have now arranged with one
of the gentlemen in Mr. Gilpin's office
to forward my letters. Mr. G. would
have been glad to have obliged me in
this himself but that he is now
most of the time. My permanent ad-
