Dear Father,

I have seen Mr. Plunkett several times lately, & it now appears that the Dom. Parliament has made some alterations in the terms on which the Windsor & Dinton Branches are to be transferred to the Syndicate. Part of the agreement with the N.S. Govt. was that these lines should be put in their hands with a clear title, and now, (by an Act now passed its second reading) the Dominion Govt. instead of confirming the Provincial legislation, puts certain conditions upon

this transfer. This has been done thru  
the influence of the Windsor & Annapolis  
Co. on purpose to worry the Syndicate  
as it will of course affect the value of  
any stock they propose to issue. Under  
the circumstances, Mr. Blunkett con-  
siders it essential to consult with  
the parties at home before commencing  
work here. He is to leave to-day  
via N. York, and leaves a letter with  
his secretary to be handed to me as  
soon as he cables on arrival on the  
other side. The terms he offers me are  
\$150 a month, and travelling expenses  
which latter are of course a small item.  
I said to him that I considered the  
amount below the mark; and also  
that I would not consider myself  
under any obligation to keep myself

the open for in the event of an other offer  
being made me, as he could not make  
his offer ~~open~~ definite before leaving -  
f. His reply was that the salary would  
be larger when the construction com-  
menced; and that he anticipated no diffi-  
culty as to the work going on as soon  
as he got across. As he is in a state  
of considerable tension just now owing  
to all the delay and annoyance to  
which he has been put, I did not  
consider it advisable to take a more  
decided stand as to salary. He com-  
plains very much of these long spending  
weeks over matters which should not  
take as many days. Things are now  
pretty well settled, however.

I saw Mr Holmes to-day. He tells  
me that he understood from Dr Levoe  
that the Survey was to go on; but I

have heard nothing myself yet. I am just as well pleased, as it leaves more time to see what will come of the Syndicate offer. I have enough work to keep both Archibald & myself going till June 15 when the present engagement ends. I shall wait till I see what turns up.

Would you advise me to go on with the present work if it offers first? I wd prefer the R'y work; & Archibald seems to think that he wd rather stand his chance of the Syndicate offer than go on with the Survey, in the position he has had. I wd keep him as my Assistant on the other work. I have reason to think also that Mr. Blenkhorn has instructed his Secretary to close arrangements with me rather than lose me in the event of my receiving another offer. There is nothing I can say to Dr. Selwyn at present.
