My dear Father,

I think it must be
nearly a week since I wrote
you, & so must write now
again in hope to catch this
week's Canadian mail. Since
last news I have been up the Rhine,
in rather bad weather. Then up
Lesse Lüneburg by the new St Gotthard
Railway to Andermatt. There
are now no diligences running
across the St. S. Pass, so I thought
I would walk over or take a
carriage, but after waiting nearly
two days at Andermatt in a

dense fog, with frequent showers, &
 very hot as well as a sponge, I
 took the train through the tunnel,
 & found comparatively fine weather on
 the other side of the cuts. I stopped at
 Avolo at the S. end of the tunnel &
 looked over the slope they had brought
 out, consisting of Gueris nice schist
 & all manner of much alluvial rock.
 I could not get away from
 Avolo again till today, & intended
 to go on to Bellinzona; but it got
 quite dark long before so I got out
 of a place called Brione & went
 on to Bellinzona next morning. There
 after a few hours stay, to Legano,
 thence to Como, & yesterday up the
 lake & by diligence to Giavani.
 Found Gravami this am at 6
 I have been in the diligence all

day, crossing the Alps in a
dense fog with rain, but the
afternoon was fortunately fine
& the chances of seeing the
foot of the route from the towns
of S. Florenz by the Via Mala &
& the place, excellent. Among
such drivers the only passenger
in the diligence, though
severally crowded at this
season. What people, however,
are leaving Switzerland for the
North of Italy owing to the bad
weather which continues to prevail.
On the Italian side it is
deliciously warm. I hardly
know now why I left it.

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It is feared the grape crop
will be very costly in many
parts of Scotland this year owing
to the unseasonable season. However
I think I have done with the
alps now. Tomorrow I propose
going to Biarritz if I can find
so many particularly interesting things
here. I would go first this
morning & give it a chance
to get to England in time
& as I am rather tired place
there now & believe we
can approach Tom
