My dear Foster,

Lamond here safely last
evening ^{day before} yesterday, & hope to leave again
in the morning. Having prepared a small
packing outfit such as the place
affords, for the mountains. It may be a
month or more before I get a good
chance of writing again. The weather
was very medicie but came in
yesterday, but I received no home
letter. I hope however you are all
well. Several copies of "Globe" reached
me, but as I subscribe to the paper it
is not worth sending yours on in future.
The weather has been exceedingly warm

a day for the last few days, burning
104° in the shade two days ago. However,
it seems to be moderating now, &
anyway one does not feel it so much
as similar temperatures would be felt
out. My plan is to go from here
into the Crows' nest pass in the first
instance & then to try the other passes as
far as time permits. I am taking
out about two months supply & will
have a month's at a ranch near the
base of the mountains. Robbie Radog
left us at Regina to join some of the
people connected with the cattle ranch, &
was to travel straight through & reach us
& then to the ranch in quick time. I
cannot learn, however, that he has
yet reached here, though he may have
passed through without being known.
After leaving Maple Creek on the railway

I trudged along the northern slopes
of the Cypress Hills, & saw what
I could of them I have been down
near the Butter, Milk & Milk
River ridge filling gaps for roads.
With regard to the Cypress Hills I scarcely
know what to say. The rocks are
well worn in most places, &
all are somewhat distinct from
Maple Creek, which is the nearest
point to us. Generally they appear
as veins of Laramie resting on
Pine, but the former has yielded
no fossils & the latter very few. Putting
the formations well to be a great
skilful barometer work. There is
absolutely nothing geological with the
exception of drift sections to be seen
along the railway to Maple Creek.

At Swift Current, however, a short
way E. of Maple Creek poor sections of
Pierre occurring sand banks are seen on
the Creek a little below the railway crossing.
Fort Walsh which was situated in the
centre of the hills, & where I thought you might
see something of the geology, has now been
entirely abandoned, & the Police are
temporarily quartered at Maple Creek.
The stage which ran from Walsh to
St. Assumption or Kamskan has also
been discontinued as the contractor would
not run any more on account of
the danger of losing his horses. If
however, you could get the Police to
do something for you, you might make
a little trip from Maple Creek into the
hills.

At 20 m. Colic between Maple Cr. &
Medicine Hat, close to the last gr. McCandless
reports good exposures of Pierre underlying
the white "Bell R. beds". I don't know

whether he found any fossils there or not. About 12 m. up the river from Medicine Hat are coal exposures in the river banks in rocks which I am now almost certain are Laramie, & probably equivalent to Judith River. I have seen a great deal of them on the way here, & though coaly shales & shales about here have often tried to recognize plant remains except a little silicified wood. I can know that as a whole a trip out by the Ry. to Medicine Hat would be a very uninteresting one geologically considering the distance travelled. I hear that grading is already going on beyond Calgary & that

the Contractor's promise to leave the
Oails there by the end of first week in
August. If you could get a pass from
the C.R. people & I am sure you
might it would perhaps be
desirable to leave out the Cypress &
go right out to Calgary, stopping
at a few places & returning direct.
I say if you could get a pass as
by rates charged the journey would
otherwise be a ^{cattle} ~~very~~ expensive one, & in
regard to eating & sleeping accommodation
is bound to be an uncomfortable one.
Dr Selwyn spoke last Friday of going
thru to Calgary this summer when
the road was complete. If you
proposed to hit off his time he
would doubtless be able to assist
you with transport or what he would
be hiring for himself. I will ask
McConnell to write to your address.

at Medicine Hat, in case you
should go there. giving you notes
on any flowers he may have found
since I left, near the track.

There is a weekly stage (backboard)
from Medicine Hat to this place
& back now. The trip takes 3 days
each way & with good weather might
be pleasant ^{though forbidding}. However it would
be a chance if the driver would be
able to take a passenger at any
given date.

I think I have now told you
about all I can on the matter
of your proposed winter trip, & am
sorry that it is not more encouraging.
I had expected to find very fine
reforms in the Cypress Hills, but
when I was did not see them.
