My dear William

Thank you so much
for letter - we were longing to hear
from home & were more than satisfied
by receiving seven at once on Tuesday
afternoon - three of them from your mother
though before self. Note writing here seems
to be one of the staple occupations, so
the slightest ~~notable~~ poor friends are ever
ready to write notes, unfortunately I am so
slow that answering these keeps me in
constant bondage. I am blocked up
by a half dozen unanswered at present
so I warn you that I must make
use of your coming for assurance & scribble

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in any fashion to you so that I may
get it done quickly.

We are living comfortably, lady & I here.
The house is good at present there are
no other lawyers in the house. Rankine
is on the other side of the street a few doors
to our left & dines with us every eve.

Judging from our first week's bill I
fear it will be impossible for us
to keep our expenses below £6. per week
which I consider shockingly dear. We
have ample funds to go on at this rate
without drawing from the Bank for
some time, unless we begin to do our
purchases at an early date. Tell me however
how much money you gave me in £5.
bills? I did not note that down at the
time & I am trying to keep correct accounts.

I am much distressed to hear of your
dear old Darcy & his father's late trial. I hope
it will not interfere with his coming to
Europe as he will all the more need

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Cherry — although nothing but consolation
 from above can much alleviate such
 a terrible trial. We are sorry too to hear
 of the floods in Montreal — we know they
 have abated, but misery & sickness as the
 winter probably continues. I cannot find
 my card-plate & Eva is asking Anna to look
 in my wardrobe for it — you will please give
 her your key.

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Tell us something of how we are spending
 our time. R. as you know met us on the
 boat & we came on here direct. the day
 following we spent going to the Victoria docks
 to see the "Tasmania". Thursday we had to
 distribute parcels taking one to Amy Maffett,
 given in charge to me from Mrs. Malson,
 also went to see Mrs. Cuthbert but she has
 gone to spend Easter week with one of her
 sons. We are however to lunch with her
 today. On the Friday it took us the best part
 of the day to hunt up Anna & had to wait
 an hour for her return from a holiday walk
 it being good Friday. The books & speaks just

as in the happiest day's of his girlhood.

On Saturday we tried to see Mr. & Mrs. Lady
Upper & Mrs King, but every one goes out of
town for Easter. Sunday all three went to
see Saphire? & I was amply rewarded. Such
teaching is good indeed, but I cannot enter
upon his subject. Monday we have set apart
for some necessary shopping but finding
Easter has still past closed my business
Mart we shalld into the pleasure of
a visit to Dr. Rousseau's large works.

various ^{other} things - Something having to be
changed we had to return on Wednesday,
but Mrs King having given us the use of
her carriage in the afternoon we took

Lady Leeman (who we found lives now at
Limbirds - hills) & the Fleetstones, found none
of them at home so spent the rest of the time

driving in the Park & feeling much like the dove with its peacock feathers. When we returned of course quiet? Ladyings at 5 o'clock we found Mrs & Miss Rae - Miss Coopers - Nina & little child & Rankine all awaiting us. It was quite overwhelming - happily we had cake on hand & so managed to give them afternoon tea. They seemed to enjoy themselves for the last in the party did not have the dinner o'clock, so we were thrown into giving a fashionable hour for dinner. Ladies I think I told you we are to lunch with Mrs Cooper's. We have also accepted an invitation to dine with the Rais on Friday 6th. The Barneys went up to visit them as soon after the 6th as we can, but Dr. B. returns from his last trip today & is to call soon to arrange Miss B. is to stay for some days before in

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the Country. Mrs P. Repath comes to town
on Monday next to attend to the opening
of the Col. Co: on the Tuesday & to lunch

Chas: Supper asking for two for us, but

ceed. Each place costs one guinea so unless
