but he cannot now go with you & me  
now because he is attending St. George's  
Hospital studying. If you can say if  
this plan would suit you it would  
at least be one step toward a decision.  
I would not like to hit three on

over there as the place she is likely to get  
the greatest pleasure.

I shall rejoice to hear of the meetings of  
the Royal Society at Ottawa being over.  
I look upon them as useless waste of  
strength & time. I hate them accordingly.

Do pray don't you worry about College  
funds as do we that <sup>work</sup> fall upon other shoul-  
ders. Unless you can include Will's interests  
well I tell you that Dr. Young. Halifax  
has \$20,000. towards a new building  
for Dalhousie College. The old building  
& site having been sold back to the funds  
so that I suppose closes all hope of his endow-  
ing a Chair of Engineering.
