Dear Father,

I have rec'd your letters
with the sketches enclosed &
will attend to them soon.
I do not quite know whether
the sketches of Rome will be
sufficiently accurate to reproduce;
but the Mediterranean I can manage
of course. I hope you are pointing
out that Rome is just the place
to turn into a lake of fire!

Dr Parsons while here lectured
on the Dispensations, showing how
each one has ended in judgement
with a way of escape made for
the few. It would be out of all
parallel if it were different with
the present dispensation, as even
the Millennium itself ends in a
revolt put down by fire from
heaven. He attributes the fact of

so many having lost the clear hope
of Christ's return, to their having lost
to begin with the thought of Christ
as a risen, living person; and it
is true that far too little is said
about this. It is more & more
striking to see the resemblance of
these last days, to the days of Noah,
as Christ pointed out. All the
progress in art & science, all the "mod-
ern improvements" just as then;
people looking to progress, civilization,
& culture, as the forces that are
to renovate the world; and quite
forgetting the promise of His coming.
I have been much impressed with the
exhortation to the individual in Rev:
16;15, as a parallel to Matt: 11;28
where Jesus turns to the individual on
seeing that His people as a nation will
reject Him.

"With & patience" must be my motto at present.
