My dear Foster,

I have had another look for specimens of wood from Clay of Queen Charlotte Islands, but without success. I also looked up the woods in Museum which I had supposed came from the Elm, Montreal, but found that they came, according to Weston, from Peel's Clay pit, near Sopan's Farm. Possibly you have seen them before, but I am sending small pieces broken from the various sticks, which need not be returned. Also specimen of a piece of wood marked 'Tertiary' 'Montreal' which has been a long time in collection & must have come from the Pleistocene but no particulars known. Also a small fragment of stick from Pleistocene Clay near St. Thomas, Quebec. Col. Weston,

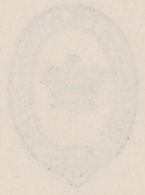
