Dearest Margaret,

I received here

today your ~~note~~ letter of the
fourth; and have again great reason
for thankfulness that you are all
well. I have of course little

to say since I wrote to you from
Clare, but write now because I may
have little time next week, and
a mail leaves this place this

afternoon. I have had fine
weather and have got on plea-
santly since I landed in Clare. To-
day is overcast, but I have no travel-
ling to do. On Monday and Tuesday

I shall be here, and on ^{on weekdays}
in the country,
on Thursday shall visit schools,
and on Friday hold my meet-
ing in Tusknet.

I have seen Mr. Christie Mr. Lawson
and other friends, and find them
all well. I hope to spend the Sab-
bath pleasantly here.

You must have made some
mistake about my journey to Black
Rock; you speak of "walking for 22
hours". This I did not do, and can-
not understand how my letter could
be so interpreted. I had a stageable
drive to Black Rock, and a boat ex-
cursion of two miles next morning, and then
a drive of 12 or 15 miles to afterport. So
you must not think me worse than
I am, but perhaps the fault was

in my last writing.

I think your annoyance about the parcels a very good one. I am sorry that you have been disappointed in the receipt of your parcels. You may however get paid that they are in the boxes, and at first they will be sent in August.

After leaving this place, my fare will be turned home-wards, and so soon as I get to Liverpool I shall be in the region of two mails per week. You must not however expect more than weekly letters, as I may miss some mails. By the time you receive this, nearly

that I am daily experiencing the

Margaret and myself. May God bless
you and the dear children, take
good care of your own health and
thine, I am quite well.
