My dear Dr<sup>s</sup> Dawson,

We arrived home last night, after a pleasant sail up the river. The coolness of Kingston is most refreshing after the warm reception we got in Montreal.

The day after I saw you we spent in further endeavours towards

securing the end of our  
visit, with so little suc-  
cess that when evening  
came I was tempted to  
feel disheartened. Almost  
as a last resource we  
paid a hasty visit, on  
Thursday morning before  
leaving, to Some Avenue.

On inspection, and after  
the lessons I had been  
taught during the three  
preceding days, the houses  
there seemed tolerable,  
at least for the winter.  
They are small, and the



rooms certainly cannot boast  
of much capacity, but  
they seem to be conveniently  
arranged. Mr. Inverary is  
in communication with Mr.  
Foster, the proprietor, and  
I hope that at last the  
difficulty may be solved,  
although not very satis-  
-factorily.

I trust Miss Dawson  
has not forgotten her  
half promise. I must  
see my friend Maud about  
it, and try to have Miss  
Wilson with her, when  
Miss Dawson comes home.
