left last night for Boston
accompanied by Dr. Forbush
Mr. J. Walker. I we have
just had a telegram from
our to - saying "Patient en-
tered voluntarily, no un-
pleasantness" - So we are
all greatly relieved for the
present.

Dr. Coles wrote to Bergen
unsolicited, saying he did
not consider it safe for R to
