We were four months in
Paris and I enjoyed much
the cool air and sea breeze
It was down my head
much food, & she may
be said to have fairly
recovered from the effects
of her severe illness. We
were also employed
on the Sunday both in
the Hotel & neighbouring
country, & before we
left we held a series

A Meeting in Charlotte Mar
& George Town. We then came
here by invitation and were
encouraged by the attendance
& interest. We have given
Lectures for ladies in the
afternoon in St. John's School
Room - (Mrs. Joseph Armstrong)
& Evening Meetings in
the Y. M. C. A. under the
auspices of the "Women's
Christian Temperance
Association." From what
we have seen, & heard,
we judge there is much
need of special efforts,
the Church appears to be
very lifeless & the

Ministry powerless, we
are told the people are
more hardened than
they were before the fire.
Fortunately enough we
heard of you the other
day & were so glad to
learn that you had
found an open door
in Paris & that your
Bible readings had been
made the means of
helping to those who
attended them. We
heard it from a Mr.
McCullum who wanted
to be you had frustrated,

& then commenced! She is
a Methodist & I suppose
it was in connection with
their church. When you
have leisure we shall
be glad to hear of you
& yours & trust you
will be able to give
a good account.
