ONLY ONE HUNDRED FRANCS EACH.

"Yes we have had an application from Roumania to provide for and settle a hundred families in Canada," said Mr. W. H. Baker, superintendent of the Baron de Hirsch Institute to-day.

"That is all I know regarding the matter beyond the fact that we were informed the immigrants would probably average about a hundred francs a piece which as you know is utterly useless to help these people. We, of course, have no funds to assist them with, so we have referred the matter to the head office, of the institute in Paris. So far as we know no agent of the institute has been appointed to accompany them.

"Were you notified of the expected expulsion of these Roumanian Jews?"

"No, we knew there was some trouble brewing that is all. But the matter has all been referred to the head office of the Baron de Hirsch institute in Paris which



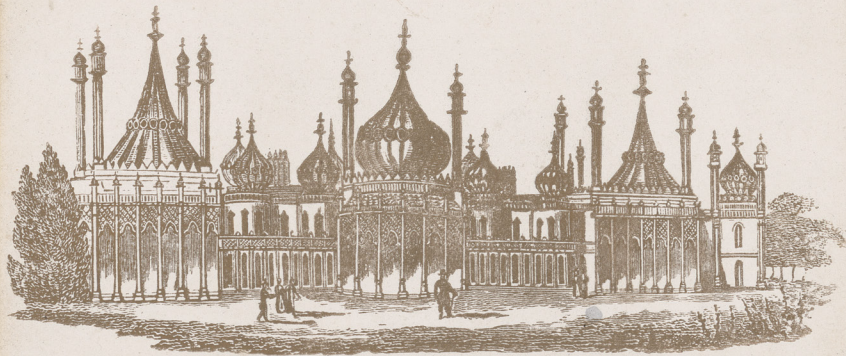
