I will be able to send one each time without extra postage now if you would be content to have them in that way; but of course I am waiting to know whether you wish me to get you any more or not. I see you have quite a program in the way of visitors for the spring. As you will see from my letter to all other one had quite a time of it yesterday evening. It was very pleasant though indeed, I think too, that the last of the meetings was well calculated to do good to the delight who were present as it was so spontaneous & earnest, & so different

to what they are accustomed to as Catholics. This morning of course I was tired, but got up as usual for my chocolate which is at 8 P, & rested afterwards. There was church this morning which I attended with A. Adamin. Dorian goes to the Lutheran church on these particular occasions. After church I walked about for a while & then returned here. I had hoped to have written a great deal today & sent you all long letters in return for all those I have received, but I have not succeeded. The greatest privation I have to put up with in connection with my work here is in having so little time to write letters. It is always a great pleasure to me, & I never say half of what I want to. I hope after this to get my work more evenly balanced, in regard to the amount of time given to each subject, & also ^{so} to get along more comfortably. I do not work hard, please do not think so. I believe I am beginning to get stout! I certainly am not thin, & am less so than I was in the autumn. } With much love,
