Dearst Anna,

Thankyou for your  
letter which arrived yesterday  
morning. I was glad to know  
that the weather was improving  
and that baby's eye was better.  
Your commissions I shall try  
to attend to. Eric and I tried  
to find the children's drawing  
books, but only one was dis-  
covered, apparently Ruth's.

Yesterday morning I spent in  
town and the afternoon in  
the museum. Alex. Robertson  
drove Mrs Carpenter & Eric <sup>begin</sup>  
out to the cemetery in the <sup>here</sup>  
afternoon and E. removed

the old flowers. I gave  
Mrs C. some money and  
got her to arrange about  
planting some flowers round  
our darlings grave. I should  
like to plant them myself  
but cannot. Whether I shall  
ever go there until I am  
carried to be laid beside  
my little one I know not,  
but just now I simply cannot.

This has been a very long  
day. In the morning I stayed  
quietly at home, not feeling like  
going out. In the afternoon Eric  
and I went up to the Molson's  
as I wished to take her a photo-  
graph. Both Mr & Mrs M  
spoke of Eric's having behaved  
so nicely when he went up

them last Sunday and they  
 seemed pleased that he had  
 done so well at school.  
 I was mistaken in saying that  
 he had got a prize for "Accounts";  
 it is for conduct. The closing  
 ceremonies are to be on Thursday,  
 but the hour is not yet announced.

Your father & I all took tea  
 with Carpy this evening. She intends  
 to leave for Jeorville on Wednesday.

I hope to go to Corns on Tuesday  
 but do not think that I shall  
 take Eric as Carpy seems to  
 count upon his helping her off  
 and besides I do not think that  
 Maggie would like to be left  
 alone in the house. I should  
 like to return to Matis on Friday  
 evening with Eric, but cannot  
 tell yet whether it will be possible

Monday Afternoon

I have spent most of the day on the doctor scout and have just seen W. G. Stewart who may possibly be induced to go down for the month of July. He is to let me know in a few days. The weather to-day is very warm and it is far from pleasant work sunning about the streets in the sun.

Your father came up to lunch with us and seemed to be in good spirits. I also saw him at the meeting of the Museum Committee. I promised to eat to dine with them and must leave in a few minutes. They are going to stay with Mrs. Redpath after all, as she objects to their taking another house. Eric is up at Allan's but is going to Carpy's for tea. She has her arrangements all made & intends to leave on Wednesday with love to all the little ones
