 his place. Really it must be  
 much the same with servants  
 in home keeping as with men,  
 particularly Indians. It  
 rained very hard last night &  
 has been stormy all day today  
 which is so dry a place as  
 Rawlrops is rather remarkable.  
 It is Sunday & has this time  
 been Sunday in Camp also  
 & I have been working myself  
 to amuse a lot of letters which  
 I am in & better own  
 duties. Joseph Bernard  
 did not get off on his new  
 trip as I have heard nothing

further of it. On consideration  
 I shall address this vote to  
 Montreal as I suppose you  
 will be back there by the time  
 it arrives. I hope Father  
 may be induced to take things  
 as early as he can when he  
 returns & will not have no  
 doubt that both he & Mother will  
 miss you very much. Now  
 there is really nothing more worth  
 writing about except to say  
 that I am quite well &  
 I am true to all services.  
 Glad to hear that Eric had a  
 chance of seeing the Jugglers

as that is a very necessary  
 part of the education of all the  
 members & branches of the family.  
 I regret that I have only once had  
 that felicity & it was so long  
 ago that many particulars  
 have slipped my recollection
