early yesterday morning and was

wore for them and seems to  
have a capital appetite.  
He said to day that he did  
not think he could possibly  
get ready to go to Monte on Saturday,  
but we shall see.

As for me I have just begun  
that iron analysis, so cannot  
say how long I may be detained.  
Everything depends upon how  
many interruptions I have.

I have been asked to day to  
go to British Columbia to report  
upon a property there, but do  
not feel inclined to do so and  
shall try to hand it over to Carlyle  
if he is to be found.

The Collyer is getting pretty well  
deserted. Cairns-Wilson left  
this afternoon for England,  
and Penhallow left for Boston

last week. Eric and I dined  
at the college last ~~week~~<sup>night</sup> and  
to-night I am going to the  
Cox's for tea. Altogether we  
have "prayed round considerable"  
Hope bought the tickets for  
the Saguenay trip and I sup-  
pose they - your mother included  
will leave on Thursday.

I wish I had time to write  
more, but must leave for  
the Cox's and can't to post  
this en route. Love for yourself
