I wish I could write you a letter every day, but so far have not found this possible; in fact I have not managed to write you one respectable letter. This must be only a note for I have an appointment with Browne immediately after tea and am anxious to find out definitely what is wrong with me. I know, however, beforehand that it is a case of knocking under and do not know what will become of us all. I was

rather better ² but before
leaving Mexico, but have
been unwell of late. I mention
this simply that you may
know how little I can be
counted upon for plans
or anything. The last
two nights I did not sleep
two hours all told. I am
sorry to give you such dis-
mal news; but as you know
have felt all along that it
was coming to this.

I have seen the Skellons today
and had a long talk with
them and obtained a good
deal of information. He is
much better and naturally
is a firm believer in the
advantages to be derived
from Colorado air. He has
never been to Trudeau

himself, but ³ says that the
doctors in the west consider
him as the first authority in
the east in cases of lung
trouble. They expect to
leave here next Tuesday or
Wednesday and to return
to Colorado Springs where
they intend to take a house
for the winter. The best
way to go to Colorado Springs
is by Rock Island - rather
than by Denver. Board &
lodging can be obtained at
Colorado Springs for about \$15
a week and is generally pretty
good. The journey takes 60
hours if all connections are
made. Your mother is
talking about some Bible
woman at Cornwall who
she thinks might be able to

relieve you, but how this
is to be arranged I do not
yet see.

go. I am so glad that
the Russels were able to pay
you a visit.
