I enclose a cutting respecting the new
Rudcliffe college for women, and
the scholarship dedicated to Mrs
Agassiz, which shows how women's
education is going on here. Up to this
time I have been very busy as
I have had little time to prepare
for my first lecture; but I
hope to have a little time
to look about later.

I received the telegram forwarded
by Edward, but the letter referred
to has not reached me. In any
case it is too late to do any
thing in the matter. I have
however despatched a reply to Mrs
Sudley, stating the circumstances.
