Dearest Anna,

I posted two English letters for you yesterday which I found at the house, but did not get a chance to write in time to catch the mail. Our journey up was comfortable but uneventful. Friends and his wife came on the train at Cacouna and Coristine at Riviere du Loup. Kate and Sissie were both at the house. They had gone up the night before, thinking that I would arrive then and had put in a night of terror on the top flat. Sissie has not succeeded in getting a

place yet, but is on the  
lookout for one.

I found matters at the building  
proceeding satisfactorily on the  
whole and think there is good  
prospect of our being ready by  
the beginning of the session.  
As yet I have not seen Laylor  
but am to meet him in town  
this morning. He sent me a  
message yesterday inviting me  
over to dinner, but I was very  
tired and preferred having a  
quiet cup of tea at home instead.  
After tea I went up to see Mrs  
Molton but found that she was  
out at Sherbrooke where she  
had gone for a few days. Miss  
Hill was there, however, and I  
had a chat with her. Mrs M.  
will be back this evening.

Everyone here is talking of the  
frightful hear of last Sunday,  
which was almost as bad as



last year. But fortunately is  
 lasted only a day. Now it  
 is very pleasant, though growing  
 warmer.

I return your Mother's Cheque  
 for \$50 as I could do nothing with  
 it at the bank. You will see  
 that she made it payable to  
 "Mrs B. F. Harrington or order",  
 instead of to A. L. Harrington or order.  
 You can destroy it, or return it,  
 and get her to sign the one which  
 I enclose instead - and you will  
 require to endorse it. You might  
 also send me a cheque for the  
 remaining \$75 of the original \$100  
 intended for the cottage. I have  
 been footing up the various items  
 and find that the improvements  
 will cost considerably more than  
 \$150 - probably \$170 or over, but  
 do not say so to your Mother.

Yesterday I went to Bowie's to  
 get some bananas for your Father

but there were no good ones in  
and I am to try again to-day.  
If there are any to be had  
I will send them by express.  
Miss Sumner has left for England.  
I called last evening to see if  
could be of any assistance to her  
in getting off, but found Selkirk  
Cross there looking after her &  
was not sorry.

I hate to pass Carpi's house;  
it looks so desolate. As yet I  
have not seen Lewis, but hope  
to look him up soon. The Porters  
are all down in Nova Scotia  
and Capper goes to join them  
this week!

I hope that Turkey will get the  
place tidied up and that you  
will get rid of ~~some~~ carpenters and  
painters and be able to settle  
down to some degree of comfort.  
I miss you all so much ~~dear~~,  
but hope to join you again before very
