My dear Anna,

Last letter he said he had  
thought of a new way of  
getting the Mag. out - viz  
printing it at our own  
cost without a publisher &  
putting it in hands of some  
unattached bookseller for sale.  
He said he was going to get  
'Specifications' for this - from  
some printer I suppose. Also  
that he hoped we could send  
the typed copy <sup>over</sup> here with  
any additional corrections we

wanted made. Also that  
it should be printed &  
finished before the end of the  
year.

In replying I told him  
that it was no good thinking  
of such early publication in  
view of the work that must  
be done yet on the U.S. & in  
connection with it. Also that  
there were some very obvious  
advantages in having a publisher  
that should be considered. I  
further said that I hoped he  
would not let the matter  
interpose in any way with

His plans as to movements  
 & that I hoped to be able to  
 give a little time after the New  
 Year, & in Sweden it quite  
 plain that I was offered some  
 private publication.

In regard to possible letters  
 of a more intimate kind, I have  
 thought of Sir C. Lyell, Dr Huxley,  
 Dr W.B. Carpenter, the Thompsons  
 & the Youngs of Halifax. Most  
 dead, but possibly we might

I have just been planning to  
 Florence to ask how the baby  
 is & she reports it better

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today. It has been  
really quite ill I fear.  
I don't know yet about  
going to Montreal on Saturday  
but will consider it.
