MISS STRATHY'S DEATH

YOUNG LADY WAS A WELL KNOWN MONTREALER, AND VERY POPULAR.

Toronto, July 11.—An 'Evening Telegram's' special London cable of yesterday's date says: 'The high wind to-day blew down the flagstaff from All Saints Church, Langham Place. In falling the pole struck a small pillar, which became detached and fell crumbling to the ground. Miss May Strathy, of Lachine, Que., and two other ladies were passing at the time, and the falling stones struck all three. Miss Strathy's skull was fractured; she died almost instantly. The other two were seriously, injured, and may succumb. Miss Strathy was sojourning with her aged grandmother at Scott's Hotel, 13 Langham street. The old lady is so feeble that the people of the house are afraid to acquaint her with the fatality.

Miss May Strathy was the eldest daughter of Mr. Edward W. Strathy, secretary of the Montreal Trust Deposit Company. Miss Strathy, who went to London to witness the coronation, was twenty-seven years of age, and was the eldest of four girls. She went over to join her aunt and grandmother in England, and was to have sailed on the 'Teutonic' in September for home.

Miss Strathy was a general favorite at Lachine, where the family have resided, and the latter will have much sympathy in their bereavement.

While quite a young girl herself, the sudden death of Miss Strathy's mother in the waiting room at Bonaventure Station left her in charge of a large family of young children, whom she brought up with all the devotion and good judgment of a mother.
