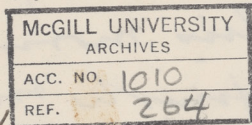


Re Lois

Dearest Anna,

Everything is going on smoothly here, so you need not have any anxiety about us.

Will went off on Friday afternoon and the little change will I am sure do him good. We have heard nothing from him but are assuming that he reached his destination safely.

Clare seems much the better for her stay at Woodstock. She went with me to the Noysis on Friday evening and enjoyed herself immensely. It was quite a

large and successful gathering

 lady talked to me for about
 half an hour without my
 being able to get any clue
 as to who she was. I in-
 troduced Clare to the former
 Counsel and he took her in
 to supper. He is a very intelli-
 gent and pleasant man
 - much more "attractive" than
 his wife. Thursday evening
 I took Eva to the Conser-
 vatorium concert which
 was a great success. It was
 in the R. V. College hall which
 was completely filled with
 people. Altogether it was
